He has served on the

boards of the Poetry Society and the Poetry Book Society and is currently on the Arts Board of the prison charity Koestler Arts, where he is also a literature judge.

Jennifer Lowe-Anker participated in the Banff Mountain Writers workshop and her award-winning memoir "Forget Me Knot", was published by Mountaineers Books in 2007. It chronicled her life with the late Alex Lowe who died in on Shishapangma in1999 and the years since with her husband, Conrad Anker.

Lowe-Anker is President of the Alex Lowe Charitable Foundation serving the mountain community of Nepal for twenty years. The Khumbu Climbing Center has provided lifesaving technical training for indigenous Nepali who work in the mountains and an earthquake-safe facility was completed in Phortse Khumbu 2019.

Jennifer has worked as a fine artist and painter for over thirty years showing her work throughout the Western United States. Her whimsical images are widely collected and showcase a passion for the wild that Lowe advocates to protect.
