Inventions: The name given by Bach to a series of short instructive pieces of a

contrapuntal nature; we have exercises in perpetual canon, gigue, canon at the unison, strict counterpoint, episode, free counter-

point, mirror canon, and fugato.

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Concertino: A work for a body of instruments (ripieno) and a contrasting solo

instrument: here, a little concerto.

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Tocatta: An instrumental piece that often exhibits the performer's

technique, frequently coupled with a:

Fugue: A contrapuntal composition, the essential feature of which is the

entrance of all voices successively in imitation of each other: it usually includes development (in this case a new one) and

concludes with a resolution in concord.

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This ballet was choreographed in 1962 when I was teaching classical ballet and jazz here at The Centre. Originally called "Pointe Counterpointe" and starring the young Jennifer Penney (now a ballerina with the Royal Ballet) it was retitled and reworked for the Norwegian Ballet and subsequently danced by the Royal Swedish Ballet, the Royal Danish Ballet, the Deutsche Oper Berlin, the Het National Balett of Holland, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the Zurich Opernhaus and won the Gold Star for Choreography in the Paris Dance Festival of 1965.

The girls and their sailor friends have gathered in front of the pub where Jasper, the pot boy, works. Pineapple Poll joins the jovial crowd to sell her wares of favours and trinkets. Jasper, who loves Poll from afar, makes an attempt to declare his love only to be rebuked by the frivolous Poll. Presently, Captain Belaye arrives and one is immediately aware of his irresistible charm to Poll and the girls of the town; but he only has eyes for his upper class fiancee Blanche, who is constantly accompanied by her dotty aunt Mrs Dimple.

In frustration and despair, the girls smuggle themselves onto the Captain's ship disguised as sailors and Poll also finds her way of joining the Captain's "new" crew. The ruse is to no avail as the Captain leaves abruptly to wed his beloved Blanche. The action becomes truly chaotic as Blanche, Mrs. Dimple and Belaye discover the true identity of the ship's company followed by the arrival of Jasper and the real sailors. However, in true Gilbert and Sullivan fashion all ends up happily when the girls and sailors are reconciled, Jasper is made Captain and instantly wins Poll's heart; Belaye becomes an Admiral, and Mrs. Dimple "Brittania" herself.

After its premiere in March of 1951, "Pineapple Poll" became an instant success with the British public. It has subsequently become a classic, performed by many ballet companies in the world. In this ballet of broad and very British humour, John Cranko has taken the place of the Gilbert half of the famed opera writing team to create a comic masterpiece. The music, arranged by Charles Mackerass is derived from ten Gilbert and Sullivan operas and Osbert Lancaster's decorations are intimately linked with the spirit of the work.

This production is made possible through the kind permission of Dieter Grafe.

For many years The Banff Centre School of Fine Arts has had, among the aims of the Dance Programme, the preparation of the young near-professional for the circumstances of a professional career.

For 1982 this aim has been implemented by the introduction of a demanding repertoire ("Aimez-vous Bach?", the pas de deux from "Don Quixote", and "Pineapple Poll"), and the creation of a new choreography ("Light Failing" by the Lee Award winner Stephanie Ballard, the collaboration of the Calgary Philharmonic under the direction of Boris Brott, and the full use of the resources of the Eric Harvie Theatre. This programme is therefore the closest approximation possible of a professional company . . . class first thing in the morning, either with Laura Alonso of the Ballet Nacional de Cuba, or Reid Anderson, Principal Dancer of the Stuttgart Ballett, rehearsal all day for a four week period under experienced repetiteurs and three subsequent performances.

Young pre-professional and professional dancers from all over Canada were auditioned, members of the Alberta Ballet have been in residence, double casting has been the policy wherever possible and the highest standards demanded.

The regular training programme of course continues, too, under teachers David Earle, co-artistic Director of the Toronto Dance Theatre; Choo Chiat Goh, Artistic Director of the Goh Ballet Company; Marta Horvath, Ballet Mistress of the Alberta Ballet Company; Brydon Paige, Artistic Director of the Alberta Ballet Company; Deirdre, Tarrant, Artistic Director of Footnote Dance Company, New Zealand; Gretchen Warren, Ballet Mistress American Ballet Theatre II; Eva von Gencsy, Freelance Choreographer and Teacher. Their workshop performances will be given in the Eric Harvie Theatre August 5 and 6, 1982.
