The Dance Program

The professional program is designed for young professional dancers and senior students. During an intensive six-week period, a company atmosphere is established. Morning class is taught by an internationally renowned teacher. Past seasons have included Mme. Laura Alonso from the Cuban Ballet, Mme. Olga Lepeshinskaya from the Bolshoi Theatre, Ms. Gloria Govrin of the New York City Ballet, Mme. Olga Evreinoff from the Kirov-Vaganova School. The remainder of the day is devoted to rehearsals that culminate in four performances in the Eric Harvie Theatre. Members of the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, who accompany the program, are under the direction of Earl Stafford of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet.

The apprentice program, an addition last year, enables less experienced dancers to participate with the professional program in daily training and performances. Training and experience in twentieth century repertory is considered paramount in the professional program. Since its inception in 1982, the repertory of programs mounted has included: *The Four Temperaments, Serenade, Concerto Barocco* and *Agon* by George Balanchine; a major revival of *Gaite Parisienne* in co-production with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet; *Façade, Les Patineurs* and *Les Rendezvous* by Sir Frederick Ashton; *Pineapple Poll* by John Cranko; *Aimez-vous Bach?*, *Hangman's Reel* and *Breaks* by Brian Macdonald, and new works by Clifford E. Lee Choreography Award recipients Constantin Patsalis, Christopher House, David Earle, Randy Glynn, and this year Mark Godden.

A collection of highly skilled and experienced teachers and choreographers help to create the ideal conditions for young dancers to grow and develop their potential. Special guests this year include the Balanchine-trained teacher and repetiteur, Victoria Simon. Coaches and teachers include Annette av Paul, 20 years principal dancer with the Royal Swedish Ballet and Les Grands Ballets Canadiens, and Marquita Lester, graduate of the National Ballet School, former dancer with the National Ballet and ballet mistress of Ballet British Columbia.

Many dancers from this course have gone directly into the professional ranks, as a result of being seen by artistic directors who are invited from across Canada to the closing performances.

BETTY FARRALLY MEMORIAL ENDOWMENT FUND



Betty Farrally, O.C.

In honour of Betty Farrally, one of Canada's great dance pioneers, The Banff Centre has set up a Memorial Endowment Scholarship Fund to be awarded annually to an outstanding artist in the summer dance program. Betty Farrally died in Kelowna on April 9, 1989 at the age of 73. This would have been her fortieth summer with The Banff Centre. A dancer, teacher and coach, Farrally had been an integral part of the Centre's dance program since the late '40s, when she and Gweneth Lloyd re-started the ballet

division. The two had come from England in 1938 to start a small ballet school, which later became the Royal Winnipeg

Along with Gweneth Ballet. Lloyd she received a Diplome d'Honneur of the Canadian Conference of the Arts. Ever active. Farrally remained co-head of the Centre's ballet division until 1981. and was artistic advisor for the past few years. She was also artistic advisor for the Alberta Ballet Company. A co-founder of the Canadian School of Ballet, Farrally started the Okanagan branch in 1957 in Kelowna, where she lived and taught. A member of the Order of Canada and a Fellow of the Royal

Academy of Dancing, Farrally received the first Canada Dance Award (along with Lloyd, Celia Franca and Ludmilla Chiriaeff) in 1984.

Diabelli Variations evokes the romanticism that pervaded early 19th century European music, literature and theatre. The ballet was originally mounted in 1973 for the dancers of the Paris Opera, and was produced a year later by Les Grands Ballets Canadiens, featuring set and costumes by Robert Prevost.

The music was created when music publisher Anton Diabelli commissioned composers to write a variation on one of his waltzes. He was astonished to receive 33 variations from Beethoven, which he published separately as the *Diabelli Variations*.

The **Agon** pieces were all modeled after examples in a French dance manual of the mid-seventeenth century. **Agon** (The Contest) is not a mythical subject piece to complete a trilogy with Apollo and Orpheus. In fact, it has no musical or choreographic subject beyond the new interpretation of the venerable dances which are its pretext. It was even conceived without provision for scenery and was independent, at least in Stravinsky's mind, of decor, period and style.

Lee Foundation and The Banff Centre School of Fine Arts to encourage the development of Canadian choreography. Award recipients, selected on an annual juried invitational basis, receive a cash award and use Banff Centre resources to showcase original works premiered as part of the annual Festival Ballet presentation.

Sequoia is dedicated to the memory of Henny Jurriens. Henny, the artistic director of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and his wife, Judy, were killed in a car accident April 9, 1989. It was his dream to inspire young choreographers in Canada; and through his encouragement and guidance, I was offered the opportunity to choreograph for the Festival Ballet.



Biographies



BRIAN MACDONALD, O.C. Program Head/Choreographer

Currently resident choroegrapher of Les Grands Ballets Canadiens and associate director at the Stratford Festival, Brian Macdonald's association with The Banff Centre goes back to 1960. He is past artistic director of the Royal Swedish Ballet and the Harkness Ballet of New York. Macdonald was awarded the Order of Canada in 1967, the Canada Council Molson Award in 1983 and The BanffCentre National Arts Award in 1988. For the Stratford Festival, he has directed The Mikado, The Gondoliers, Iolanthe, and Pirates of Penzance. Last year, The Mikado completed an American tour

which ended in an extended run on Broadway and two Tony nominations. In 1987, he also mounted new productions for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the New York City Opera, the Edinburgh Festival, Kennedy Center in Washington, La Scala and the Sydney Opera House. He has directed operas, created ballets, staged musicals and produced galas, including the opening of the Calgary Centre for Performing Arts and the St. Patrick's Day Gala for Prime Minister Mulroney and President Reagan.



OLGA EVREINOFF Master Class Instructor

Ms. Evreinoff was professionally trained in the Soviet Union and is a graduate of the Vaganova (Kirov) Ballet School. After her graduation she danced in Prague and later Oslo, Norway. She was also a guest artist with the National Ballet of Canada and the Canadian Opera Company between 1969 and 1985. She considers teaching her real calling, and has instructed with the School of American Ballet and Joffrey's Summer School in Berkeley, California as well as the National Ballet School. In 1980, Evreinoff returned to Canada and became the National Ballet of Canada's guest ballet mistress.


She has also had long term associations with American Ballet Theater, the London Festival Ballet, Asami Maki Ballet of Tokyo, Aterballetto, Italy and Les Grands Ballets Canadiens. In 1987, Olga helped Mikhail Baryshnikov in re-starting Raymonda dia vertissement for the American Ballet Theater. This year she is staging productions for the Royal Swedish Ballet as well as the Royal Ballet Company in London. Ms. Evreinoff is also a co-author of a ballet class record recently released. She presently lives in Ottawa, is married to a Belgian scientist, and has three children. This is Ms. Evreinoff's first summer with the Banff Festival Ballet.



GLORIA GOVRIN Master Class Instructor

Ms. Govrin comes to Banff's Festival Ballet for the first time. At the age of 12 she was a scholarship student at the School of American Ballet in New York and was offered an apprenticeship with the New York City Ballet at age 16. The following year she entered the company as a full member and was made a soloist almost immediately. She is best known for her roles in Western Symphony, Stars and Stripes, Apollo, Agon, Episodes, Con Amore, Symphony in C, and Four Temperaments. Roles choreographed for her by Balanchine include Raymonda Variations, Coffee in the Nutcracker,

Harlequinade, Hippolita in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, the Princess in *Firebird*, as well as both Clarinade and Night Spirit in *Don Quixote*. Ms. Govrin retired in 1974 after a fifteen-year career with the New York City Ballet, and opened her own ballet school in New Hope, Pennsylvania. She is presently teaching ballet at the Pennsylvania Ballet School in Philadelphia.



EARL STAFFORD Conductor/Music Director

Award-winning pianist Earl Stafford is currently in his fifth season as conductor and music director for the Banff Festival Ballet. He joined the Royal Winnipeg Ballet as principal pianist in 1975, and since that time has virtually performed around the world, receiving critical accolades for his sensitive artistry. Stafford was awarded the Gold Medal for Accompanist at the 1980 International Ballet Competition in Varno, Bulgaria. A native of Thunder Bay, Ontario, he began his piano studies at the age of eight and made his professional soloist debut two years later with the Thunder Bay Symphony. Stafford

has studied at the University of Toronto, with Milton Kaye in New York, the Paris Conservatory (conductor's course under Franco Ferrara, piano studies with Aldo Ciccolini), and has been a guest conductor with the Tokyo City Philharmonic, Vancouver Symphony, Calgary Philharmonic, Regina Symphony, Winnipeg Symphony, Thunder Bay Orchestra and the National Arts Centre Orchestra.



MARK GODDEN Choreographer, Sequoia

Mark Godden is this year's recipient of the Clifford E. Lee Choreography Award. A native of Dallas, Texas, he has been dancing with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet since June of 1984. He began preparing for a performance career at Carnegie-Mellon University where he studied acting for two years. His interest in dance led him to train with Hugh Nini at the Denton School of Ballet in Texas and in 1981, Mark moved to Winnipeg to continue his ballet training at the Royal Winnipeg Ballet School professional division under the direction of David Moroni. Mark performs a variety of roles in the Royal Winnipeg

Ballet repertoire, including feature roles in Romeo and Juliet, Swan Lake, 5 Tangos, Rodeo, Four Last Songs and Adagio Hammerklavier. In addition to his career as a dancer, Mark is an active choreographer. In 1988, his ballet Forms and Distinction was premiered by the students of the professional division in Dance Spectrum '88 and, under the direction of Henny Jurriens, went on to represent the Royal Winnipeg Ballet at the Canada Dance Festival in Ottawa and was featured on the program of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet's performances of Ballet in the Park.



VICTORIA SIMON Staging, Agon

Victoria Simon is one of a handful of Balanchine-trained dancers gifted with the ability to remember and re-create his masterpieces. She began her training at the age of eight in his School of American Ballet, and was a candy cane in the original cast of his *Nutcracker*. She was accepted into the New York City Ballet at 18, and since 1965 has staged 18 of his classics for some 60 companies in the United States, Canada, Europe and Australia. Ms. Simon has more recently started to create her own ballets, with *French Suite* (1982) and *Royal Symphony* (1984) entering the repertoire of Ballet Metropolitan

in Ohio, as well as *Cascades* (1987) for the Des Moines Ballet and *Romance* (1988) for the Nashville Ballet. A native New Yorker, she is married to John Wion, principal flutist for the New York City Opera.



MICHEL SZCZESNIAK Pianist, Diabelli Variations

Michel Szczesniak has been active as a soloist, chamber musician and accompanist since coming to Canada in 1983. He has performed in Winnipeg at the Artspace, the West End Cultural Centre, the Manitoba Conservatory of Music and Arts, the Universities of Manitoba and of Saskatchewan and at the Mendel Art Gallery in Saskatoon. As principal pianist for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Mr. Szczesniak has performed with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and has appeared as a soloist during the ballet's North American tours. His concerts have been broadcast on the CBC's Arts Encounters and

Music West. He can be heard in collaboration with violinist Victor Schultz on a compact disk of new music under the Manitoba Composers' Association label. Originally from Long Island, New York, Mr. Szczesniak studied with Jeaneane Dowis, Martin Canin and Seymour Lipkin. He has degrees from the Manhattan School of Music and the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Active as a pianist in the New York Metropolitan area, he has also performed at the Aspen (Colorado) and Waterloo (New Jersey) festivals. Mr. Szczesniak currently makes his home in Winnipeg with his wife Gisele (herself a violinist), and their three boys.



ANNETTE AV PAUL Ballet Instructor/Staging, Diabelli Variations

Former principal ballerina with the Royal Swedish Ballet, the Harkness Ballet of New York, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and Les Grands Ballets Canadiens, Annette av Paul retired from the stage in 1984, having danced principal roles in all the major classics, and in ballets by George Balanchine, Antony Tudor, Kenneth MacMillan, Glen Tetley, Yuri Grigorovitch and Brian Macdonald. In 1986 Ms. av Paul became the founding artistic director of Ballet British Columbia and worked with the company until 1988. Active as a teacher, coach and

adjudicator across Canada, she has most recently worked for the National Ballet of Canada, George Brown College in Toronto and Ecole Superieur de Danse du Québec. She first performed at The Banff Centre in 1964, and has since returned many times to dance, teach and to mount several ballets created by director and choreographer Brian Macdonald, her husband. Annette av Paul is part of the advisory committee of the Ryerson Dance Department and the president of the Dance in Canada Association.



MARQUITA WITHAM-LESTER Ballet Mistress/Instructor

A native of Vancouver, Marquita received her early ballet training from Kay Armstrong. At 13 she was chosen by Celia Franca to attend the National Ballet School, studying under teachers such as Betty Oliphant, Nancy Schwenker and Margaret Saul. Upon graduation, Marquita was accepted into the National Ballet of Canada, under the direction of Celia Franca, dancing in such ballets as Balanchine's Serenade, John Cranko's Romeo and Juliet, Eric Bruhn's Swan Lake and La Sylphide, and Celia Franca's Offenback and Nutcracker. Marquita left the National Ballet Company to co-

found and direct the Lester School of Dance and the Trent Regional Ballet Association in Peterborough, Ontario from 1971 to 1981. She then returned to the National Ballet School and received her teacher's training degree, with A.I.S.T.D. and L.I.S.T.D. standing. In 1983, Marquita was appointed ballet mistress of the Alberta Ballet Company under the direction of Brydon Paige, and from 1985 to 1988 she was the artistic coordinator and assistant. Marquita has been on the faculty of the dance program at The Banff Centre for the past seven years, as well as teaching in the training program. She has adjudicated both the Lower and Upper Vancouver Island Dance Festivals, the Provincial Dance finals for the B.C. Festival of the Arts and the 3rd Annual Cechetti Classical Ballet Awards. Last summer she was a guest teacher for the Goh Ballet's Summer School and has taught master classes and teaching seminars in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Alaska, Montana and Wyoming. In the summer of 1988 she took up her new responsibilities as ballet mistress of Ballet British Columbia, where she is currently employed.



RHODA LEVINE Acting Instructor

Rhoda has worked as director/choreographer both on and off Broadway, the West End in London and for the CBS and NET television networks. Her work has been seen at the Netherlands Opera, the Brussels Opera and the Scottish Opera, as well as the opera companies in San Francisco, Houston, Dallas and New York City, where she most recently directed the world premiere of Anthony Davis's *The Life and Times of Malcolm X*. She has also worked at the Festival of 2 Worlds (Spoleto and Charleston), the Jerusalem Festival, the Cabrillo Festival, the Nottingham Festival and the Holland Festival, to name a few. Rhoda has been on the faculty of the



This is her sixth summer designing the Festival Ballet repertory and teaching at The Banff Centre. From 1980-82 Ms. Reisman was a visiting professor at Emerson College in Boston. She has also been a guest artist at Kent State University, West Virginia University, The College of Santa Fe and at Bennington College. She has recently conducted master classes and workshops in New Zealand, Singapore and Cuba at the invitation of local arts organizations and the training divisions of their respective governments. In the fall of 1988, she was one of six stage designers selected by the American-Soviet Theatre Initiative to travel throughout the Soviet Union as a guest of the Union of Theatre Artists.
