OPERA AT BANFF

The Banff Centre's Opera program trains young professionals singers at the beginning of their careers. The aim is to teach participants skills that will serve them throughout their careers as singer/actors and to create a non-threatening atmosphere in which they can learn to trust their own thoughts, feelings and imaginations.

SYNOPSIS

Leporello, Don Giovanni's servant, is waiting by night outside the house of Donna Anna. As Don Giovanni emerges, Donna Anna tries to discover the identity of her would-be seducer, and when her father, the Commendatore, draws a sword on the intruder, Giovanni mortally wounds him before escaping. Anna and her lover Don Ottavio swear vengeance on the unknown murderer.

A former mistress of Giovanni's, named Donna Elvira, comes looking for the man who betrayed her. She interrupts a conversation between Giovanni and Leprello, but Leprello distracts her with a detailed account of his master's conquests, and Giovanni escapes again.

At the wedding of the peasant Masetto and Zerlina, Giovanni's nearsuccessful seduction of the bride is interrupted by Elvira, as well as by Anna, who has recognizes him as her attacker.

Later, Anna, her fiance Ottavio, and Elvira attend a party in Giovanni's palace. They unmask and accuse him, but he once more eludes them.

Giovanni now serenades Elvira's maid, having ordered Leporello to lure Elvira away, and Giovanni disguises himself as Leporello to evade a beating at the hands of the peasants. Giovanni and Leporello meet in the cemetery, where Giovanni bids Leporello to invite the statue of the Commendatore to supper: the statue accepts and arrives to drag Giovanni down to Hell.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Don Giovanni, one of the crowning favorites of the operatic repertoire, is considered by many to be the greatest opera ever written. No other opera has occasioned so much discussion and controversy, and its comic-tragic themes and philosophic overtones continue to fascinate music lovers and literary critics the world over.

Even today, the interpretation of the opera continues to fascinate. Is it a comic opera or a tragic one? Is its plot, as Beethoven thought, an immoral gibe, unworthy of Mozart's music? Is it really a morality play in which the main character is punished for his sins? Or is it a fable of man's pitiful and repetitive efforts to rise above his capacities, only to be continually thwarted and beaten down? Perhaps no story except Faust and certainly no other single opera, has had so many interpreters and interpretations. Possibly Mozart and Da Ponte were the last two persons to whom the libretto and score of Don Giovanni presented no great philosophical dilemnas.

Composer and librettist called it a "dramma giocoso." The work was, in fact, specifically commissioned to be a comic entertainment which, it was hoped, would succeed the tremendously popular *Le Nozze di Figaro* as Prague's hit of the season. The Italian libretto is witty, most of the characters are humorous, and many of the situations are ludicrous, despite their occasional overtones of supernatural horror. Perhaps the epilogue sets the tone of the whole work in a catchy refrain: Don Giovanni, that seducer, betrayer and evildoer, is casually relegated by his victims to no worse a fate than the domain of Pluto and Persephone.

RESIDENT ARTISTS

RHODA LEVINE

Program Director

Rhoda has worked as director/choreographer both on and off Broadway in the West End in London, and for the CBS and NET television networks. Her work has been seen at the Netherlands Opera, the Brussels Opera, and the Scottish Opera as well as at opera companies in San Francisco, Houston and Dallas. In New York City, she directed the world premiere of Anthony Davis' The Life and Times of Malcolm X as well as Janacek's The House of the Dead and Die Soldaten. She has also worked at the Festival of Two Worlds (Spoleto and Charleston) and, among others, the Jerusalem, Cabrillo, Nottingham and Holland festivals. Rhoda has been on the faculty of the Yale School of Drama, the Curtis Institute of Music, the Juilliard School the Manhattan School of Music, the Mannes College of Music, and Northwestern University. She is the author of eight children's books and has written libretti for Luciano Berio and Stanley Hollingsworth. Along with Philip Glass and George Abbott, she was the recipient of the National Institute of Music Theatre Award for her contribution to American music theatre.

RONALD ZOLLMAN

Music Director/Conductor

Born in Antwerp, Belgium, Ronald Zollman began his musical training at the age of four. He attended the Royal Conservatory of Antwerp, the Brussels Royal Conservatory and the Accademia Chigiana in Sienna where he obtained the Diploma of Merit. He has appeared as guest conductor with symphonic orchestras and at international festivals throughout Europe and Great Britain. He has conducted for the Belgian National Opera, the English National Opera, the Scottish Opera and with the BBC Symphony Orchestra. His interest in contemporary music has lead to associations with the London Sinfonietta and the Ensemble Intercontemporain in Paris. Zollman's recent debut with the Basler Sinfonie Orchester and the Jeunesses Musicales World Orchestra in Berlin were unanimously acclaimed.

BRIAN MACDONALD, O.C.

Director

Anoriginal member of the National Ballet of Canada, Brian Macdonald is currently resident choreographer of Les Grands Ballets Canadiens and associate director at the Stratford Festival. His association with The Banff Centre dates back to 1960. As well, Macdonald was artistic director of the Royal Swedish Ballet, the Harkness Ballet of New York and the Batsheva Company of Israel. He is well-known as a choreographer and director of opera and musical theatre, and has directed a series of Gilbert and Sullivan productions for the Stratford Festival, all of which became television specials. Since 1987, he has mounted new productions for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the New York City Opera, the Edinburgh Festival, the Kennedy Center in Washington, La Scala, the Sydney Opera House, Les Ballets Jazz, the Edmonton and Manitoba operas and the Canadian Opera Company. For the Broadway run of The Mikado, he received Tony award nominations both as director and as choreographer. Macdonald was awarded the Order of Canada in 1967, the Canada Council Molson Award in 1983 and The Banff Centre for the Arts National Award in 1988. He recently choreographed and directed The Mikado and Gypsy for the Stratford Festival.

KRISTIN AHLGREN

Assistant Stage Manager

Kristin is a native and current resident of Long Beach, California, and holds the unofficial mileage-driven-to-work record in the U.S. She has worked with theatres in San Francisco, California, New Haven, Connecticutt, San Diego, and Costa Mesa, California as well as Banff, and has driven to each. She is waiting for a contract in Florida to complete her tour of the continental United States. Her most recent credits include ASM positions on the pre-Broadway company of *Tommy* and Lee Blessing's *Fortinbras* both at the La Jolla Playhouse. This is Kristin's first opera after years of dramas and musicals.

JENNIFER BRUMER

Assistant Lighting Designer

Jennifer is a recent graduate of the University of Western Ontario. While there she designed the lighting for several Theatre Western productions including *The Crucible* and Gilbert and Sullivan's *The*

Yeomen of the Guard. This past year she worked as assistant lighting designer at the Grand Theatre on productions of Miss Julie, A Christmas Carol, Democracy, and Moon for the Misbegotten. In September, Jennifer will begin a Master of Fine Arts Degree in lighting design at University of Victoria.

CORRADINA CAPORELLO

Text Coach

Born in Rome, Italy, Corradina received her doctorate in Italian medieval literature from Columbia University in 1987. She trained in Italian diction with Evelina Colorni at the Juilliard School. She taught Italian language and literature at the John Jay College for Criminal Justice, Columbia University, Queen's College, the C.W. Post Long Island University and is a member of the Italian Honor Society. She belongs to the Emergency Musicians Fund Committee, and is a member of the board of directors of the Puccini Foundation. Since 1984 she has been teaching Italian diction and repertory at the Juilliard School. At the Juilliard Opera Center she has worked in Il trittico, Don Giovanni, Amelia al ballo, Cosi fan tutte, L'amico Fritz, Lo sposo deluso/Le donne rivali, Falstafff and Don Pasquale. She coached Matrimonio Segreto in Ischia, Italy and will return there in September for La Cenerentola. She lectures and teaches at the Bel Canto Institute in New Paltz. Next spring she will give Master classes and seminars in Taiwan.

MICHAEL CAVANAGH

Assistant Director

Michael hails from Winnipeg, and has worked in professional opera as a performer, a stage manager, a production manager, and a stage director. He has focussed his energies on writing and directing since 1991 after studying in Hamburg, Germany. He has written the librettos for two successful chamber operas: Gisela in Her Bathtub, and City Workers In Love. In September Michael will present his latest work, The Bachelor Farmers of the Apocalypse, commissioned by the Manitoba Arts Council. Next season he is engaged as Assistant Director for Vancouver Opera's entire season and will direct their touring production of Don Giovanni.

ALLISON GAGNON

Repetiteur/Surtitles

A native of Montréal, Allison divides her time during the year between teaching at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario and performing in recitals as a staff accompanist at McGill University in Montréal. She also plays annually for the CIBC National Competitive Festival of Music and has been heard in recital on CBC Radio/Radio Canada. She was pianist for the National Youth Orchestra until last summer, when she took part in the Academy of Singing at Banff. Allison holds degrees from Queen's and McGill, as well as the Konzertdiplom from the Hochschule fur Musik in Vienna, Austria. "Playing for *Don Giovanni* has been my first opportunity to work in opera at the professional level; it has been an invaluable experience for me to see the musical work transformed for the stage."

CLAUDE GIRARD

Set and Costume Designer

Claude Girard first made his mark in painting before working for the theatre. He studied at the École des Beaux-Arts in Quebec City and at the Academy of Venice, Italy. His first project was with Les Grands Ballets Canadiens for the opening of EXPO '67. Since then he has worked for many major Canadian dance companies. At The Banff Centre, he has designed sets for the productions Findings, Double Quartet, Etapes and most recently Firebird with Brian Macdonald, and Gaite Parisienne, with Lorne Massine. He has also designed sets, costumes and lighting for more than 15 opera houses; these include L'Opera de Montréal, Opera de Québec, Opera de Nancy (France), Opera of Detroit, Tulsa Opera, Dayton Opera, Kentucky Opera, Opera of Philadelphia, Seattle Opera and Portland Opera. A few of the productions that he has designed sets, costumes and lighting for are I Pagliacci, La Boheme, Madame Butterfly, Romeo and Juliet, Nabucco, The Barber of Seville, and The Merry Widow. He has also directed many shows at Place Des Arts Montreal, at the Palais des Congres and the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées of Paris. Until 1985 he was an art teacher and the dean of the art department of College Brebeuf of Montréal.

MARTHA GLEESON

Wig and Make-up Designer

Born in Ottawa and currently working out of Toronto, Martha Gleeson has been involved with make-up and wigs for close to twenty years. She has a long association with the Canadian Opera Company where she created Canada's first year long training program. She created the special make-up effects for Hal Prince's Kiss of the Spiderwoman. Her recent film credits include JFK and Alive.

KATHLEEN EDWARDS

Assistant Stage Manager

Originally from Fort Lauderdale, Florida, Kathleen is currently pursuing a Masters degree in Stage Management at the University of Cincinnati College - Conservatory of Music. She has worked with Boston Lyric Opera, Fort Lauderdale Opera, Palm Beach Opera and Cincinnati Ballet. Recently, Kathleen stage managed a tour to Russia and the Ukraine with The Chekhov Theatre and Film Company of Boston. She aspires to one day be part of the stage management team at San Francisco Opera and says that there is "no such thing as 'not in my job description." She would like to thank her parents for driving all the way from North Carolina to see this production.

CAROLISAAC

Repetiteur/Continuo

Carol, born on the Canadian side of Niagra Falls, graduated from the University of Toronto with a Master of Music in solo piano performance where she studied with Soviet pianist Boris Lysenko. She has also studied with pianist Karl Ulrich Schnabel and performed in masterclasses with Richard Woitach, Martin Iseppand Dalton Baldwin. She has spent the last year in Banff, participating in the Academy of Singing, the Music Theatre Program, and now, with the Opera program. In the fall Carol will begin doctoral studies at the University of Michigan with Martin Katz for which she received a Canada Council Arts B Grant.

KEVIN LAMOTTE

Lighting Designer

Kevin Lamotte is the recipient of the 1990 Pauline McGibbon Award and 5 Dora Mayor Moore Nominations. He studied at The Banff

Centre and New York's Studio Forum of Stage Design. Recent credits include *Three Sisters, La Tragédie de Carmen* for The Banff Centre, and *Silver King, Candida, Counsellor-at-law, Drums in the Night* for the Shaw Festival. He has worked for most of Canada's theatre and opera companies and was an associate lighting designer for *Cats* Canada and *Les Miserables* in Canada and Australia. He is a member of the Associated Designers of Canada.

MARK MORASH

Vocal Coach

Mark works as a vocal coach and assistant chorus master for the Canadian Opera Company. He has also worked for WolfTrap Opera as a coach and assistant conductor. He presently teaches Italian diction at the University of Toronto. This is Mark's third season with the Banff Opera program.

D'ARCY POULTNEY

Assistant Set & Costume Designer

D'Arcy, originally from Toronto, currently lives on a farm near Meaford, Ontario, (near Walt Wingfield's). He is a graduate of the National Theatre School, and has designed sets for *The Sound of Music, The Moustrap*, and costumes for *A Midsummer Nights' Dream*. He regards his summer at Banff as "a wonderful experience and a great opportunity (operatunity) to learn from the best."

RICHARD A. RAUB

Vocal Coach

Richard has been on staff with the Banff Opera program for the last five summers, serving as vocal coach, assistant conductor and chorus master. During the rest of the year, he is a vocal coach and assistant conductor for the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Academy of Vocal Arts. He is also a coach and pianist for the Luciano Pavarotti/Opera Company of Philadelphia International Voice Competition. This past December Richard conducted *Hansel and Gretel* in Philadelphia.

JAMES SHEERIN

Fight Choreographer

Jim is a founding member of Stuntworks Acting Company in New

York, as well as a member of the New York Fight Ensemble and the Society of American Fight Directors. Most recently, Jim has worked at the Pennsylvania Rennaisance Fair a stunt coordinator, where he has been for the last three years, and at the University of Maryland, where he has taught for five years. He has worked with Rhoda Levine at New York City Opera, having served as fight choreographer for her productions of *Malcolm X* and *Die Soldaten*. Jim recently returned from the Amazon where he was filming a documentary. He is happy to return for a second season in Banff.

CHERYL TIERNEY HORNE

Company Manager/Program Coordinator

Cherylisoriginally from Wisconsin and has worked across the United States as a Stage Manager, Company Manager, Assistant Director, Production Manager and Tour Manager for over 10 years in theatre and opera companies. This year she will be at Boston Lyric Opera working on *I Puritani, Carmen*, and *The Postman Always Rings Twice*. She will also be at Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, where she is the Production Stage Manager, working on *Candide*, *Falstaff*, *Iphigenia*, and *Black River*. This is her third summer with the Banff Opera program.

ERIC TRUDEL

French Diction Coach/Vocal Coach

Eric was born in Québec City. He received his master's degree from the Conservatory of Music in Montréal. He currently teaches at the Conservatory of Music in Montréal, and the Université du Quebec à Montréal, and has just accepted a position as an assistant conductor from Les Grande Ballets Canadiens in Montréal. He has worked as a vocal coach and a diction teacher in various opera houses both in Canada and in Europe, as well as pursuing a career both as a soloist and an accompanist. He is now completing his studies as a conductor in Montréal. This is his third summer at Banff.

DALLIS WRIGHT

Movement & Dance Instructor

Dallis returns for her second year as movement instructor for the opera program. She is also movement instructor for the Academy of Singing and period dance instructor/choreographer for the Drama Department this year. Dallis received a BFA in Dance from York

University and has taught dance at various colleges. Since that time she has performed in and choreographed for musical theatre in the Yukon, B.C., Ontario and the Maritimes. Stage Manager

She has performed recitals in the Rachmaninoff Conservatory and at Maison Lafitte in Paris, at the French Embassy in Washington DC, in Nice and in Princeton. This season Norah has two recitals scheduled in Michigan and Florida which she will coach with Martin Katz. She was the winner of the Mario Lanza competition in Philadelphia in 1992, and won first prize in the NATS competition in 1992 and 1993. Norah has performed the roles of Lillian Russell in The Mother of Us All, and, last year, at the age of 18, she performed the

role of **Anne Trulove** in *The Rake's Progress*. She would most like to perform the roles of **Mimi** in *La Boheme*, **Marguerite** in *Faust*, and **Micaela** in *Carmen*. She looks forward to her upcoming role as the **Countess** in *Le Nozze di Figaro*.

He has done concert and oratorio work in B.C. with the Victoria Symphony, the Vancouver Cantata Singers, the Vancouver Handel Society, and with the Portland Baroque Orchestra. His favorite roles include Leporello, Sparafucile in Rigoletto, and the Lord High Chancello in Iolanthe, and he looks forward to adding Mozart's Figaro to his repetoire list as well. He also hopes to sing King Philip II someday. This season he will make his debut with the Prince George Symphony doing Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and with the Okanagan Symphony singing St. Matthew's Passion.

"Leporello is a housetrained peasant with a taste for pheasant. He criticizes Giovanni's behavior, yet longs to lead that lifestyle himself. He is a hypocritical Sancho Panza; with Figaro's smarts thrown in for good measure."

CASSANDRA HOFFMAN

Ensemble (New York City)

Originally from Manhattan, Kansas, Cassandra moved to New York to attend the Mannes College of Music. There she has performed in both contemporary and early operas, taking a special interest in baroque music. She recently performed the title role in John Eccles' Semele, and hopes to have the opportunity to sing Handel opera someday.

RANDALL JAKOBSH

Leporello (Toronto)

Born in Wetaskiwin, Alberta, Randall holds a degree in voice from the University of Calgary where he also studied violin and German. He also holds an Opera Diploma from the University of Toronto, Opera Division — where he performed the title role in Figaro during their 1992 season. Two years ago Randall won first place in the National Opera Association Competition in Chicago for singers 24 years of age and under, as well as the Ontario and Alberta Provincials. Randall can also be seen this season as Sarastro in Mozart's The Magic Flute with Opera Atelier in Toronto.

SIPHIWE MCKENZIE

Ensemble (Vancouver)

Born and raised in Vancouver, and a graduate of the University of British Columbia Performance Program, Siphiwe has performed with many different musical groups in the area including the International du Maurier Jazz Festival (where she was a soloist last summer), and the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. Her favorite operatic roles include Dorabella and Despina in Cosi fan tutte, Rosina in Il Barbiere di Siviglia, Carmen, Desdemona in Otello and Donna Elvira in Don Giovanni. "Don Giovanni is one of Mozart's greatest operas. It has it all: sex, violence and drama - all supported by fabulous music."

She also participated in the Opera McGill program for 3 years and is presently studying at the University of Toronto's Opera Division. "The beauty of the piece is that those who suffer abuse come through it with heroicism and integrity. The tragedy of the piece is that Giovanni's only means to enjoy life is to tamper with the emotions and lives of others."

A lifelong resident of Winnipeg, Vic has performed extensively through Manitoba as an oratorio soloist. "Masetto, bridegroom of Zerlina, a true peasant, is a teeth-gnashing frustrated person who is an explosion of towering rage except when in the company of Zerlina - when he becomes a little baby."

Don Ottavio (Montréal)

Michiel moved to Canada from Soest in the Netherlands. He recently received his Bachelor of Music degree from McGill University, and will return to Montréal for a Master's. He looks forward to his debuts with both Toronto's Opera in Concert and the Pacific Opera Victoria. His favorite roles have included Tamino in Die Zauberflote, Troilus in Walton's Troilus and Cressida, and Romeo in Gounod's Romeo et Juliette. He would someday like to perform the roles of Mark in Tippett's Midsummer Marriage, Rodolfo in La Boheme and Riccardo in Un Ballo in Maschera.

"Ottavio's had a rough deal from everyone except Mozart, who gave him some pretty nice music, thank you very much! I think he's just as passionate as the rest of the characters, but his idea of vengeance is having Giovanni in front of the law, not running him through with a sword. His lawfulness, unfortunately, makes him pale beside the others who run around screaming blue murder."

CLAUDE SOULODRE

Masetto (Toronto)

Originally from Edmonton, Alberta, Claude began his vocal studies at the University of Victoria where he received a Bachelor of Music Degree with Honors in Voice. He has appeared with the University of Victoria Opera Ensemble, Pacific Opera Victoria, Edmonton Opera, and Prairie Opera. For Banff Centre Music Theatre, Claude appeared in Kurt Weill's Johnny Johnson and Street Scene, Janacek's Cunning Little Vixen, and Robert Ward's The Crucible. Among the roles in his operatic repertoire include Figaro, Father in Hansel and Gretel, and Franck in Die Fledermaus. This December, Claude will be heard in the role of Sir Tristan Mickleford in Flotow's Martha with Toronto Opera in Concert.

MATTHEW THOMAS

Don Giovanni (Toronto)

Matthew, a native of Toronto, is returning to the Banff Centre for the Performing Arts for his third summer. The piece has been set in Harlem, Seventeenth Century Spain and all points in between. I see him as an escaped denizen of the Underworld whose time on earth is fast running out."
